

Literacy

Blend sounds into words, so they can read short words with known-letter-sound correspondences.

Writing


- To continue daily handwriting practice using lined whiteboards, with plenty of modelling (to support correct letter formation.
- Provide opportunities for children to create and tell their own stories using story sacks and character prompts; scribe and share their stories to model structure and vocabulary.
- Support correct formation of lowercase and capital letters, focusing on letter size and position on the line, and begin dictating simple sentences using taught sounds.
- Model how to read and re-read writing to check it makes sense, and help children sequence stories using beginning, middle, end structure and key storytelling language.
- Encourage children to retell stories using pictures or their own story maps, and to write simple captions or sentences linked to their storytelling.

Maths

- Explore numbers 1, 2 and 3 by finding, subitising, representing, comparing, and understanding "1 more", "1 less", and how these numbers are made.
- Learn and use vocabulary linked to early number to build confidence in mathematical talk.
- Identify, name, and compare circles and triangles, using everyday language to describe shape properties and noticing these shapes in the environment.
- Extend number learning to 1–5 by finding, subitising, representing, and exploring compositions of 4 and 5, and combining numbers up to 5 using key vocabulary.
- Identify and explore shapes with four sides, combine them in play, notice them in the
 environment, and talk about daily sequencing vocabulary (today, yesterday, before,
 after).


Understanding the World

- Explore how people have different beliefs and celebrate special occasions in a variety of ways, using role play, videos, and cultural celebrations to support understanding.
- Promote respect for differences such as during Anti-Bullying Week and create inclusive environments with diverse resources.
- Encourage children to learn how to care for the natural environment through discussions and forest school experiences.



Personal Social and Emotions Development

- Use books, puppets, dolls, and small-world play to help children explore friendship, feelings, and social experiences.
- Share stories and provide resources that reflect a wide range of emotions, cultures, traditions, and family backgrounds.
- Involve parents in their child's learning and build understanding of each child's home culture through regular engagement.
- Support independence by co-creating rules, using visual routines, encouraging children to make choices, and discussing safety (e.g., safe pedestrian skills).
- Provide frequent opportunities for sharing, turn-taking, and cooperative play through games and group activities.

Communication and Language

- Build listening skills through games, signals, environmental sound walks, role play, active listening modelling, and encouraging children to listen to peers, take turns, and join small group conversations.
- Develop rich language and thinking by modelling vocabulary, asking open ended questions, thinking aloud, expanding children's sentences, supporting emotional expression, introducing new words in play, and engaging in shared thinking.
- Promote storytelling and book talk by reading aloud daily, re-reading familiar texts, modelling enjoyment, discussing characters and plot, linking stories to real life.
- Encourage narrative and communication skills through predicting, explaining, problem solving, negotiating language, experimenting with words and sounds, developing story sequences in play, and helping children use appropriate conversation.

Physical Development

- Provide daily energetic outdoor play and varied indoor/outdoor opportunities that allow children to move in different ways, explore new movements, and build physical confidence.
- Model clear movement vocabulary and support children in developing body control through activities such as stretching, reaching, curling, twisting and balancing.
- Develop fine motor skills through daily letter formation practice, using right/left handed scissors for cutting more intricate shapes, and introducing finer tools such as thin paintbrushes.

Expressive Arts and Design

- Explore different types of marks found in nature (spirals, lines, dots) and replicate them using materials such as charcoal, chalk, pastels, leaf rubbings and prints.
- Learn about primary colours and use them to create secondary colours.
- Begin using a wider range of colours, brushes and techniques, including experimenting
 with colour to represent themes such as dark night skies/Bonfire Night, inspired by
 artists like Vincent Van Gogh.
- Take part in music and drama activities for the Christmas show.
- Use instruments with increasing control to express feelings.
